> Culbertson, youth rehabilitation officer for the Idaho Department of Health, said that while the clubs help "many hundreds of boys who are not delinquent," the clubs also reach successfully many delinquent and underprivileged youths.

> "A larger number of children who have been in difficulty come to the Boys Club in Lewiston than to any other program of its kind in north Idaho," 'Culbertson said.

> Culbertson stressed the need for a correction of the public image of children, providing youths with more opportunities to have responsibilities and build creative activities, such

painting, singing and the playing of musical instruments.
